Second Chance *Cats*

All animals deserve a safe, loving, healthy home.

When they arrive at the shelter, orphaned kittens as well as sick, stray, abused and abandoned cats are given a second chance for a good life and a forever home by our caring staff and volunteers.

Many of our Happy Tails stories are tales of cats that got their fair share of their legendary nine lives. Cats that have been returned to the shelter because of changes in their families' lives are in desperate need of a second chance.

Chris Kyes was volunteering at the shelter when Gordie was returned by his family because "We have dogs now." The big white cat with handsome butterscotch markings was moaning in the small carrier. "He only makes that noise when he's upset," the man assured us.

Chris couldn't get Gordie out of her mind and heart and two months later adopted him into her forever home with her other three rescued cats. "I wish more people would consider adopting these returned older cats," she said. "All they want is a chance to have a nice home again."

These cats are healthy and their personalities are evident, though they often blossom away from the shelter environment where they must adapt to many other cats. Chris reports that after three months, Gordie has adapted well to his new forever home.

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TNR *A call to arms!*

At present, there are an estimated 60 million stray and feral cats roaming the United States. Feral cats are cats who have been abandoned by humans and have reverted to a "wild" state by necessity, left on their own to find food and shelter.

In this issue's President's Message, Cate Amador describes the abuse that Hope the cat suffered at the hands of children at an apartment complex in Michigan City. The proximity of stray and feral cats like Hope is a function of the millions of Americans who think it's OK to abandon animals when they tire of them, or when other priorities trump the cost of spaying and neutering. The exposure of these cats to danger is one of the symptoms of overpopulation.

Traditional methods used by local municipalities have been to trap, remove and euthanize. In spite of this long-accepted practice, research indicates that trapping and

President's Message



Hope

Pain is not entertainment. Fear is not funny.

This photo has been purposely cropped to spare people the disturbing sight of what a group of children did to this sweet tortie. (If you would like to see the full pictures, as well as the news coverage, visit our website.)

Hope was one of several stray and feral cats living in the vicinity of an apartment complex in Michigan City where children have a history of torturing animals. Poor Hope was friendly, and when she approached the children, eager for something to eat or maybe a little attention, they poured a caustic substance, probably bleach, on her. When she tried to take refuge in a window well, they poked her with sticks and threw rocks at her. Thanks to a dedicated cat lover, she was rescued and taken to Dr. Laurence Reed at Westchester. Sue Ogg, ICS Vice President, passed Hope's information on to area rescues and a foster home was found. When Hope has healed, she will have a permanent home where she will be safe and loved.

Hope will recover, but we realize that there is a serious problem that needs to be addressed. ICS is spearheading a task force that will attack the problem in several ways, starting with that particular area, then reaching further. This complex is a known hot spot, but it is not the only place where animals are being abused. And it's past time to end it.

Children who take pleasure in inflicting pain on helpless creatures do so for many complex reasons, including acting out on a vulnerable target what has happened to them, and they are at risk of escalating antisocial behavior as they get older. For this reason, violence towards animals should be a universal concern.

There will be many ways you can get involved, such as helping with humane education or advocacy; watch the website or contact the shelter for more information. This problem will not be easily or quickly solved, but ICS cannot and will not turn away while cats like Hope suffer.

ethanization actually has a negative effect on the population control. It does, in fact, make the populations more dense by something called the *vacuum effect*, which occurs in a colony when some cats are removed. The remaining cats intensify their mating behavior in order to fill the void. The food source remains constant, but with fewer cats feeding, the remaining cats get more food, become healthier, and have more successful breeding cycles. These conditions actually result in even more cats. To put it simply, trap and remove does NOT work.

Trap, neuter, return (TNR) is a full-management plan in which free-roaming cats are humanely trapped, spayed or neutered, vaccinated and returned to the location they came from to rejoin their colony, and it DOES work. The colony size is ultimately reduced by attrition. Part of the management plan includes a caretaker who is responsible for feeding and monitoring the cats general health, and who also keeps a lookout for new cats entering the colony who have not been fixed. When new cats are found, they are trapped and fixed, and returned to the colony.

In general, feral cats are not adoptable, and attempts to relocate them may prove fatal to the cat, because they will try to get back to the location of their original colony. Cats living in colonies form strong bonds, and do quite well on their own with a caretaker looking after their basic needs.

TNR is a progressive movement that is being used in many cities across the US as the preferred method of humane control. IndyFeral in Indianapolis has one of the best and most respected TNR programs, having fixed over 10,000 cats since 2002. The resulting reduction in stray/feral cat intake in Indianapolis for 2006 saved Marion county taxpayers \$193,800, an amount up from \$29,850 for 2005.¹⁾

With TNR, everyone wins, including the cats. Nuisance complaints to animal control drop significantly because fixed cats living in colonies are less aggressive, make less noise, and are less likely to roam into harm's way. Millions of dollars a year are spent across the US trapping, holding, and euthanizing cats; the average cost of sterilization is about one third the cost of trapping and euthanizing.

Approximately 25,000 healthy cats die in shelters each day.²⁾ Irresponsible pet ownership and abandonment have led to this overpopulation crisis. It's a crisis we humans have created, and a problem we humans are morally obligated to fix.

The stray and feral overpopulation is everyone's problem. In TNR, government officials, trappers, vets, and caretakers work together to put in place the mechanism by which TNR occurs, with the ultimate goal a reduction in stray populations and subsequent reduction in the number of cats and kittens entering shelters.

TNR is sanctioned by the Humane Society of the United States³⁾ and the ASPCA⁴⁾ as the ONLY approved humane and effective treatment of cat overpopulation in the United States.

You may be feeding a colony of these stray cats, or know someone who is. ICS has been engaged informally with TNR for some time, but we are now in the planning stages of a more formal, more aggressive plan to work with trappers, governments, and veterinarians to reduce the feral populations in La Porte and Porter counties. Some older cats that have spent their lives at our no-kill shelter get a second chance to spend the rest of their long lives in a forever home.

Patience is a dilute calico cat that didn't get along with other cats and was returned more than once because she has some eccentric habits. She spent her days in a large cage near the entrance of the shelter.

When Ralph and Lorraine Heavilin came in each month to leave their memorial contribution for their cats Andy and Barney, they visited with Patience. Mr. Heavilin decided that if Patience didn't go home with them that "She'd die in that cage." The couple and Patience have adapted well to each other.

Special-needs cats get a second or third or fourth chance in foster or adoptive homes with special people who are willing to take on the special health or behavior challenges.

Linda Moore, an ICS board member, not only takes in cats with special medical problems, she goes the extra mile to see that their pain is eased and, if possible, the problem corrected. Linda's taken in three cats born without hip sockets causing them problems with their back legs. She adopted Scooty Patooty from a local animal control. When a couple rescued, but couldn't keep, a kitten they had rescued from a bitter winter, Linda took him, too, because he had a similar hip socket problem as Scooty and her kitten Kris Kringle.

Since that time Linda has researched treatments for the problem and has taken the cats to specialists in Indiana and Illinois to give them a second chance.
